With so many people wanting to say such negative things about our colleges and universities so often, getting the public to think, even for a moment, about the indispensable roles that these institutions play is important. That makes this particular list a real value.

COMMUNITY **GROWTH PROGRAM**

Powered by Heartland Forward, the **Community Growth Program** is aimed at turning entrepreneurs' (we call them Builders!) ideas into reality.

Builders undergo a 90-day program that includes a 45-day Bootcamp to teach participants how to put ideas into action, followed by 45 days of actively executing their ideas through experiments with access of up to \$5,000 to use.




















SPOTLIGHT ON OUR ALUMNI

CONNECTING THE HEARTLAND

Connecting the Heartland is a multi-pronged, multistate initiative dedicated to boosting affordable. high-speed internet access and adoption throughout America's heartland. We believe that when people have high-speed internet access, doors open to them — to everything from healthcare, employment, education and so much more.



This year, we made great strides in our work to bridge the digital divide in Arkansas, Illinois, Ohio and Tennessee:

- Launched the **Accelerate program**, with the **Benton Institute for Broadband and** Society, to 28 communities across three states with 30 hours of expert counsel to teach community leaders how to develop broadband plans and access federal funding.
- Partnership with the League of United Latin American Citizens (LULAC) to reach over 380,350 people in Latino communities with information about the Affordable Connectivity Program. Through local council-led events — at churches, grocery stores, festivals and more — we supported over 9,900 people in enrolling in ACP to access affordable internet service and devices.

- Kicked off the second year with a cohort of 14 American Connection Corps (ACC) **fellows** with a Hill Day in Washington D.C. Launched a digital equity mini-grant **program** for the fellows to pilot highly tailored, innovative digital skills training models.


